4. Leadership can run best-case and worst-case scenarios
5. Growth decisions are tied to financial visibility

4. Operational Finance Discipline

1. Financial processes are documented
2. Teams are not relying on disconnected spreadsheets
3. Financial systems are integrated properly
4. Revenue recognition is handled consistently
5. Financial operations are not dependent on one person

5. Investor & Board Readiness

1. Reporting packages are presentation-ready
2. Financials can withstand investor scrutiny
3. Board meetings are not rushed due to reporting delays
4. Leadership can confidently explain financial performance
5. Data is organized and accessible during diligence requests

6. Post-Acquisition Stability

1. Legacy processes from prior ownership have been cleaned up
2. Historical reporting issues have been corrected
3. The company has established a clean financial baseline
4. Leadership has visibility into profitability drivers
5. The finance function supports decision-making, not just bookkeeping
